#### 1 Kimberly Sophia, Born at 30 weeks

Ortilia Carolina had wanted a child for a long time. When she found out she was pregnant, she was so grateful and excited.


Her pregnancy progressed uneventfully when suddenly, with no warning, she started having contractions. She was only 7 months pregnant. After Ortilia was in the hospital for three days, Kimberly Sophia was born. She was 30 weeks and weighed 2 pounds, 15 ounces.

Ortilia reflected on getting released from the hospital and going home to her apartment without her baby girl. She says, "I felt so bad. The house was all ready, but no baby." She went to see Kimberly in the NICU every day from 8:00am to 2:00pm and then again from 7:00 to 9:00pm. Her doctor tried to tell her to take it easy, since she was still recovering from a c-section. "But I said this is my baby. I have to see her."

Ortilia also felt a lot of guilt; she had never seen a premature baby before and thought it was her fault the baby was born so early. Then she met several Tiny Miracles parent mentors. "They told me their stories and helped explain things to me."

When Kimberly was released from the hospital after 45 days, Ortilia received clothing and diapers as a gift from TTMF.

Kimberly is now a beautiful 10-month-old, and is getting stronger every day! ♥

#### Victoria Maignan, Born at 30 weeks

In 2012, Rolanda Domercant was pregnant and excited to become a mom for the first time. She had lost her first pregnancy, so this one was especially meaningful. However, it was a difficult, high-risk pregnancy, and she battled high blood pressure and depression.

On December 19th, when Rolanda was 30 weeks pregnant, her water broke and baby Victoria was born at Stamford Hospital weighing just 1 pound, 6 ounces.

Rolanda remembers, "In the NICU, it was scary. Very scary. I had to have faith. I just kept telling myself she would make it."


Tiny Miracles played a big role for Rolanda. "They talked to me. They gave me a lot of hope. The doctors told me she would be okay, but it's different when a mom says it — somebody who has been through the same thing."

Rolanda also used Tiny Miracle's Financial Assistance Program (FAP) to help her get through the financial strain of having a baby in the NICU. "Tiny Miracles helped me with rent, transportation, and baby clothes. They helped a lot — a lot".

Victoria is now 20 months old. She battles ear infections and may need speech therapy, but she's walking and getting stronger every day. Rolanda says happily, "It's going to take time, but she's going to make it."

# Program Spotlight: Parent Mentoring and Support

The birth of a premature baby is often a frightening and isolating time for parents. They can feel helpless as they see their infant enclosed in an isolette, connected to tubes and wires. They are unable to hold their newborn and have countless questions. Frequently it is their first experience with premature babies and, sitting in the NICU, they may feel very alone.

This is where our TTMF Parent Mentoring Program comes in. Our volunteer mentors are all parents of preemies who have lived with the emotional rollercoaster and vulnerability of being a parent of a child in the NICU. These compassionate, specially-trained mentors visit the Bridgeport, Danbury, Stamford and Norwalk NICUs every week to connect with parents.

While every mentoring experience is different, on any given visit our mentors might: listen to the concerns and fears of each parent; share some of their own personal experiences; help to explain what goes on in the NICU and some of the things they might expect; talk about the joy, and challenges, they might face when they get to bring their baby home; or just sit quietly and keep someone company. The focus is upon providing comfort and sharing a sense of hope with new preemie parents in a way that only parents who have been in that situation can provide. (Our mentors do not offer medical advice, suggest treatment options, or make referrals to physicians or specialists.)

The ability to share experiences and to provide empathy and understanding is invaluable to new preemie parents, and each year the number of parents seeking our mentors grows. In response to this need, we are expanding our TTMF mentor program and are planning more extensive training sessions over the coming year. •

# Mentor Spotlight: Karen Green



Karen loves being a mentor and giving back to the preemie community. She enjoys meeting people from different backgrounds and finds satisfaction in helping someone go from being a scared parent of a preemie to becoming a confident parent of a baby.

"There are many people to focus on the babies, especially the problems or issues of the babies, but as mentors we're there to focus on the parents. How can we help you become a more comfortable and confident parent?"




# Community Miracle Makers



# Volunteer Spotlight: Marisela Esposito

We are blessed with many wonderful volunteers and each year we like to spotlight one of them. In this issue, we proudly introduce Marisela Esposito...

Sela has been living in Weston for 22 years. In July of 2001, she and her husband, Seve, unexpectedly delivered twin daughters at 21 weeks, due to pregnancy complications. The babies, unfortunately, were born too early to survive. In March of 2003, Sela gave birth to Dante, a 25 week micro-preemie, weighing 1 lb. 15 oz., at Norwalk Hospital. The day that Dante was born, Seve took a photo of his and Dante's tiny hands. The photo was so striking that when Dante was released to go home, Sela and Seve gave a print of the photo to the Norwalk NICU. Several years later, with Sela and Seve's permission, that photo became part of The Tiny Miracles Foundation.

When Sela met Gwen Noto at an event in 2008, she knew she wanted to be more involved with TTMF. When time allowed in 2011, she trained as a Parent Mentor for Norwalk Hospital. Sela vividly remembers her first day as a mentor when she provided much-needed support to a bereaved mother of 21-week twin girls. She remembers feeling nervous but realized it was something which she needed to do. "My first mentoring experience was the most difficult yet the most rewarding thing I've ever done. I left feeling like I was there that day for a purpose and was really able to help this mom and her husband." Sela continues to be a Parent Mentor at Norwalk Hospital and still finds the experience rewarding. "Mentoring allows me to continue my healing process while honoring the memory of my twin daughters and offering hope and strength to preemie parents in honor of Dante and all

of his struggles throughout his NICU

rollercoaster ride."

Sela joined the TTMF Board in 2012 and serves on the Fundraising, Financial Assistance Program (FAP) and PR/Marketing committees. "Being a part of these committees allows me to experience and be a part of the "full circle" of what TTMF is all about." In addition to countless hours of envelope stuffing, fleece cutting, and other volunteer efforts, Sela also served as cochair for this year's enormously successful Tiny Miracles gala in May. •

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
