Similarly, we've noticed that, by our producing just one annual newsletter, the gap in time has been too much, especially when we have so much good news to share. Starting with this Fall 2022 Impact Report, we intend to be in touch more often.

The Tiny Miracles Foundation just turned 18, and – much like the 18-year-old in your life – we did amazing things this year and still have so much more to accomplish and celebrate ahead.

We want to use this issue to convey our increased impact on more families in more ways across southwestern Connecticut over the past 12 months. There are exciting numbers to share but mainly we'll let some of the parents we've helped tell the story. As these families attest, Tiny Miracles is there to support anxious parents in our six partner hospitals and also during the transition home – emotionally, practically and financially.

We're connecting with more parents more often in more ways. We've just completed our first full year of helping families in New Haven County through our partnership with Yale New Haven Children's Hospital. Our staff and volunteers proved more than up for the task, while also integrating what had been a pandemic-forced adjustment – connecting with parents online – into now a permanent hybrid model of both in-person and virtual mentoring.

We were grateful that COVID restrictions eased this spring, allowing us to host our annual gala in-person for the first time since 2019 – and even more grateful when the event raised \$300,000.

To those who attended the gala, to those whose names are listed in the end pages of this report, and to those whose support was given so compassionately but without measure or reward, we thank you. Your gifts provided comfort and care this year to the families of Rachel and Michele, Molly, Hank and Wiley, Amara, Oliver, Isla and hundreds of other tiny miracles. Via 6 hospitals and an array of virtual programs, we are supporting more families than at any previous point in our 18 year history.

Rachel and Michele Born at 30 weeks at Bridgeport Hospital

In their mom's words

I never considered that I would spend a month in the NICU. I should have known it was a possibility but the reality was I had a very unexciting pregnancy from a medical sense. I was pregnant with twins but I was healthy and so were they. I had one weird blood pressure but following monitoring was sent home "in the clear." Until that same night. My water started to break and we rushed to the hospital. Despite efforts to stop my labor, within 10 hours of my water breaking our daughters Michele and Rachel were born 10 weeks premature by emergency C-section.

They were rushed to the NICU and our real adventure began. I don't remember as much as I would like to from that day. It was raw, it was scary and everything kept happening so fast. There are a few things that stood out that day: seeing our daughters and getting to touch them that first time, finally being in a hospital room, and a bright purple cooler with items for both our daughters, information for us and a card for me. That card was my first lifeline to support that I would so desperately need.

Parenthood is scary for anyone but, when your child (or children) are so helpless they can't sustain breath or eat on their own, you don't necessarily know who else will understand what you are going through and help you stay strong. Sandra from Tiny Miracles was part of my strength. I had a card from her with her contact information right away. There was no pressure for me to do anything but she was there for me when I needed her.

We spent 36 days in the NICU. 36 days without our friends and family being able to be with us and see our girls. But 36 days with Tiny Miracles friends who stopped in and saw our girls, celebrated them and understood how exciting it was to be able to change their diaper, put clothes on that first time, have them in open-air cribs, and be able to give a bottle. Most people take these things for granted. The average parent is blessed with not knowing about oxygen, feeding tubes, central lines, desaturations, diaper weights and the many, many temperature checks, but we were blessed with Tiny Miracles and perhaps that is better.

That's what Tiny Miracles did for our family.



On January 21, 2022, I had to emergently have a C-section at 33 weeks gestation due to placental abruption. It was a very scary night for us. On top of that, I was struggling with symptoms of COVID. We did not know if Amara or I would make it that night.

After she was safely delivered, she was sent to the NICU and I was not able to hold or see her in person for a week. Leelee, a Tiny Miracles mentor, FaceTimed with me and I was able to see my baby for the 1st time and ensure that she was ok.

Every day someone from the Tiny Miracles team checked on us and gave us so many useful things. I am so thankful for everything The Tiny Miracles Foundation has done and continues to do for others!


